FRANKLIN'S POLICE DEPARTMENT

Currently, the Franklin Township Police Department has 95 Officers; this is down from 2008 when there were 125 Officers. In 2000, the Census reported 50,903 residents in the Township. That number climbed to 62,300 in the 2010 Census. At this time, the Police Department is searching for qualified applicants in an effort to bring the force to 99.

The Police Department is comprised of 85 males and 10 Females. Education is a valued asset for the officers. There are 15 with Masters Degrees, 25 with Bachelor's Degrees, and 13 with Associates Degrees. Numerous officers are currently enrolled in accredited colleges and universities earning degrees of higher education.

ON-GOING TRAINING

The New Jersey Attorney General set forth very strict guidelines regarding the annual training of police officers. Officers receive bi-annual training in the use of force and firearms qualifications. Additionally, officers who are certified to utilize patrol rifles must shoot on an active fire course four times a year. The officers receive annual training in vehicle pursuit guidelines and domestic violence. They are also mandated to receive right-to-know and hazardous materials awareness training.

The Franklin Township Police go above and beyond these guidelines and provide CPR/First aid to all of its officers. Several officers are certified as Emergency Medical Technicians. Franklin Officers will receive training in such other areas as cultural diversity, harassment in the workplace, and officer survival. As laws change and evolve, the officers will receive training and updates so that they can more effectively do their jobs.

POLICE ACCREDITATION

Currently, the Franklin Police Department is going through the process of becoming accredited through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). This process involves the systematic review of all the departments' rules, regulations and orders. Once this is completed, "proofs" or examples must be found in the daily operations of the Department to ensure that these rules, regulations and orders are being followed. At the end of the process, CALEA will audit the Department's "proofs" to ensure compliance. The Department hopes that it will be prepared for a final review by CALEA near the end of the summer.

OFFICERS ON TRAFFIC DUTY

It is often said that Police resources could better be allocated if they were not used to assist traffic crews such as PSE&G or Verizon. The reality is that the officers assigned to road crews are not on duty. These officers have signed up to work these extra-duty positions in their off hours. The taxpayer doesn't pay for these officers, but the contractor who is billed by the Township for the service as

well as an administrative fee. The Township collects the fees and disburses the payment to the officers.

GOING ABOVE AND BEYOND

An officer patrolling on the streets is just one aspect of the job. There are many other things that the Department does that aren't readily apparent. Currently 17 officers, in their off time, participate in Project RESPECT. In this program, officers act as liaisons to the Township's senior population. They attend their meetings and provide them with safety talks and demonstrations.

Operation Blue Angel was started in 2010. Using drug forfeiture money, the Police Department purchased lock boxes that they provide to senior citizens and those that have illnesses that could cause them to become incapacitated. This will allow responders to get into the home when seconds count. This program is provided to the residents free of charge.

Currently, the Township has 13 active community watch groups that are managed by the Department. These watch groups are a "self-help" group for the neighborhoods. They act as the eyes and ears for the department.

The Traffic Safety Bureau will take appointments to make sure that new parents' car seats are installed correctly. Currently the Department has four officers that are certified car seat techs.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

The Department has four officers in the Patrol Division that are assigned to the Emergency Services Unit. They are all certified Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) and have additional training in fire suppression. Their vehicles are outfitted with additional medical and other equipment so they can stabilize a patient prior to the arrival of the first aid squad.

TV VS. REALITY

Television programs such as NCIS and Criminal Minds are set so that every crime is solved in one hour, with commercial breaks. The reality is that many painstaking hours of investigation are needed to solve many crimes. In New Jersey, there is one crime lab that processes all DNA and other trace types of evidence for all 566 municipalities in the state. This, in and of itself, makes solving a crime in one hour on DNA evidence alone problematic. In reality, the majority of crimes that are solved are done with hard work and the keen investigative skills of well-trained officers and detectives.

DEPARTMENT'S NEW CHIEF AND DEPUTY

In November, 2011, Lawrence W. Roberts was promoted from the rank of Deputy Chief to Chief of Police. He replaced retired Police Chief Craig Novick. In April, 2012 Richard A. Grammar was promoted to the rank of Deputy Chief of Police from Lieutenant.

I purchased a home that has an existing alarm system. Do I need to reregister?

Yes, you need to register the alarm in your name and with your contacts. There is also a one-time registration fee.

Does a contractor who is going to work in my house have to be registered or licensed in Franklin? Or with the state? Can the Township recommend a contractor?

A contractor working on your house needs to be registered with the State of New Jersey as a "Home Improvement Contractor." You may ask for proof. If they do not have it or refuse to supply it, find another contractor. The Township is not allowed to recommend contractors.

How do we dispose of a home portable fire extinguisher that has been replaced but never used?

Fire extinguishers are accepted at the Hazardous Household Waste Collection days. See the recycling information the last page of this newsletter for locations and dates.

I heard about NJMCdirect for payment of tickets. Can we use that for a ticket here in Franklin?

Yes you can, if it is a payable parking or traffic ticket. When you go into the website, http://njcourts.judiciary.state. nj.us/njmcdirect/atswepr2/home.do, enter court code 1808, ticket prefix, and the ticket and license plate numbers. If it is a payable violation, it will show the amount due—the fine plus a convenience fee. If it's not payable, it will indicate that you should contact the court. VISA, MasterCard or any card that contains the VISA or MasterCard logo may be used.

I didn't get a tax bill, yet the taxes were due May 1. I ended up paying a penalty. When are the taxes due and isn't there a tax bill sent each time the taxes are due?

Since the Township moved in January, 2012 to a calendar year rather than a fiscal year, tax bills are going to be mailed once a year. The tax bills were mailed at the end of July showing all four quarterly payments: February, May, August and November. Some homeowners may receive an adjusted quarter due to the homestead rebate but should use the original bill for the remaining quarters. To just review the amount owed, residents can go to the Revenue page on the Township website and follow the instructions to pay online. No online payment is required to review the amount that is due.

Can we recycle bottle caps or should they be thrown away and just the bottle recycled? Caps cannot be recycled and should be removed.

JFK Blvd. is in terrible shape. Is it on the list to be resurfaced?

Portions of JFK will be resurfaced in the next phase of roadwork bids. The listing of roads to be resurfaced is on the website, www.franklintwpnj.org, and updated on a regular basis

Flooding Knows No Borders

FRANKLIN PARTNERS WITH OTHER COMMUNITIES TOWARD A COMMON GOAL

As detailed in other articles that have been published in the Franklin Times, there are many small things that Franklin Township residents can do to improve our watersheds, rivers and streams in order to make them cleaner and healthier. It takes a larger effort, however, to provide protection from the damaging effects of flooding, and that is why Franklin has joined with eight other municipalities (Hillsborough, Millstone, Rocky Hill, South Bound Brook, Somerville, Bridgewater, Montgomery and Manville) and Somerset County to form the Raritan and Millstone Rivers Flood Control Commission.

The Commission first met on February 1, 2012 to begin planning ways to protect residents during the all-too-frequent major storms that have hit our area. Spurred on by the success of the Green Brook Flood Control Commission to get the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) to construct flood protections around Bound Brook and other adjacent communities, the Commission's initial goal is to make sure a study currently being undertaken by the USACE is fully funded and is completed expeditiously.

The Army Corps study is slated to cost \$6.8 million and has been either only partially

funded or not funded at all during recent fiscal years. The Commission is busy contacting our federal representatives in order to procure full funding for the project. The Green Brook project has taken forty years to get to its current stage, but the Raritan and Millstone Rivers Flood Control Commission realizes that people are being flooded out of their homes now and is looking for ways to condense the timeline considerably.

In the meantime, the Commission is exploring smaller projects or grants that can alleviate individual homeowners flooding problems, such as seeking funding to elevate homes. The USACE gives a monthly update on their study, and there is a guest speaker at every meeting to provide insight to the public and board members. Future speakers include FEMA, the NJDEP and a representative from the Green Brook Flood Control Commission.

Residents are encouraged to attend Commission meetings held the fourth Wednesday of every month at 7:00 PM. The next meeting is scheduled for September 26th in the Borough of Manville municipal building. Guest speakers scheduled are homeowners from Manville who recently or currently elevated their homes who will discuss their experiences and the difficulties encountered during their projects.

POLICE TIP

As hurricane season approaches, remember:

- Do not attempt to drive through standing water. The depth of the water is not always obvious, and the roadbed may be washed out under the water. Six inches of water will reach the bottom of most passenger cars, causing loss of control and possible stalling.
- Do not drive around a barricade. They are there for your protection. Turn around and find another route.

Franklin Township Flood Risks

The flooding, power outages and extensive damage caused last year by Hurricane Irene and Tropical Storm Lee is clearly still on the minds of Township residents. Even if you don't live near a watercourse, you still may be at risk from flooding because of differing sets of circumstances at work, such as frozen soils or saturated soils, storm duration, and storm intensity. Nearly 25% of flood insurance claims come from moderate-to-low flood risk areas.

Township Flood Services: The first thing you should do is check your flood hazard. Flood maps and flood protection references are available from the Franklin Township Public Library. and the Engineering Department in the Municipal Building.

The Engineering Department can answer your specific questions or can perform a site visit to review your surface flooding problem and explain ways to stop flooding or prevent flood damage. They can be reached at (732) 873-2500 ext. 6230, or feel free to stop by any weekday from 7:30 to 4:30.

What You Can Do: Here are some things you can do to

- Do not dump or throw anything into ditches, swales or streams. Even grass clippings and branches can accumulate and plug channels.
- If your property is next to a ditch, swale or stream, please do your part and keep the banks clear of brush and debris.
- If you see debris in drainage ways maintained by the Township, contact Public Works at (732) 249-7800.
- Always check with the Zoning and Construction Departments prior to building on your property as permits may be necessary. Contact the Engineering Department before you clear, fill, remove soil or regrade your property.
- If you see construction without a permit sign posted, contact the Construction Department at (732) 873-2500 ext. 6220. If you see grading or tree removal on a property, contact the Engineering Department to confirm that the proper permits were secured.

Flood Protection: There are several ways to protect a building from flood damage. For buildings constructed within the floodplain; flood walls, earthen berms, waterproofing of walls and installation of watertight closures over doorways are some options as well as moving and/or raising the elevation of the structure. If your building is within an actual floodplain, we recommend that you contact either the Engineering or Construction Department for specific help and recommendations.

Some houses, even those not in the floodplain, have sewers that back up into the basement during heavy rains. If you are concerned with sewer backups, you may wish to contact a plumber about installing a backup valve. A plumbing permit would need to be obtained. If you know that a flood is coming, you should shut off gas and electricity and move valuable contents upstairs. Fire is one of the major causes of damage in floods. It is recommended that you make a detailed checklist in advance in order to be properly prepared.

Flood Insurance: If you do not have flood insurance, talk to your insurance agent. <u>Homeowner's insurance</u> policies do not cover damage from floods. However,

because Franklin Township participates in the National Flood Insurance Program, you can purchase a separate flood insurance policy. This insurance is backed by the Federal government and is available to everyone, even for properties that have previously flooded.

For properties with little or no flood loss history, there is a low-cost Preferred Risk Policy (PRP) available. For a much lower cost than a Standard Flood Insurance Policy, lower risk homeowners can insure themselves against losses. For more information on how to qualify for a Preferred Risk Policy, homeowners can call FEMA's Flood Insurance Hotline at 1-800-427-4661 or speak directly with their local insurance agent.

Another valuable resource is FEMA's www.floodsmart. gov website. By simply entering your address, you can get a rating of your flood risk, an estimate of flood insurance premiums and a list of nearby insurance agents.

Some people have purchased flood insurance because it was required by the bank when they got a mortgage or home improvement loan. Usually these policies just cover the building's structure and not the contents. There is usually much more damage done to the furniture and other building contents than there is to the actual structure.

If your flooding problem is caused by sewer backup, you may wish to speak to your insurance agent about a sewer backup rider to homeowner's insurance policy.

Don't wait for the next flood to buy insurance protection. There is a 30-day waiting period before National Flood Insurance Program coverage takes effect.

Flood Safety

Do not walk through flowing water. Drowning is the number one cause of flood deaths. Currents can be deceptive; six inches of moving water can knock you off

Do not drive through a flooded area. More people drown in their cars than anywhere else. Do not drive around road barriers, the road or bridge may be washed out.

Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. The number two flood killer after drowning is electrocution. Report downed power lines to the power company.

Have your electricity turned off by the power **company.** Some appliances, such as televisions, keep electrical charges even after they have been unplugged. Don't use appliances or motors that have gotten wet unless they have been taken apart, cleaned and dried. **Look out for animals, especially snakes.** Small animals that have been flooded out of their homes may seek shelter in yours. Use a pole or stick to turn things over

before picking them up. **Look before you step.** After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris. Floors and stairs can get covered with mud and become very slippery.

Avoid wading through the flood water. Oils, vehicle fluids, chemicals and even raw sewage can mix with flood waters, creating unsanitary and even hazardous conditions.

Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Don't smoke or use candles, lanterns or open flames unless you know for sure that the gas has been turned off and the area has been ventilated.

Franklin Township ranked 8th overall in the recently-released listing of municipal top performers for authorized construction for 2011. The listing, based on dollar amount totals, was announced by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of Codes and Standards, with 562 of New Jersey's 566 municipalities reporting and counted in the totals.

Falling Leaves—Use Them Or Bag Them

The Township's annual leaf collection program information follows. But one alternative for dealing with leaves is backyard composting. Composting results in a dark, friable, partially decomposed substance similar to natural organic matter found in the soil The end product can be added to enrich the soil, used as mulch to control weeds, used in potting soil, and can help reduce alternate freezing and thawing of soils which injure roots of plans. To learn more, contact Rutgers Cooperative Extension and ask for Fact Sheet 074, Backyard Leaf Composting, and Fact Sheet 117, Using Leaf Compost. Annual Leaf Collection

Leaf collection dates are Mondays. If Monday is a holiday, leaves will be collected the following day.

October 29 November 5, 13, 19, 26

Leaf bags are available at the Municipal Clerk's office in the Municipal Building, 475 DeMott Lane, and at the Department of Public Works, 40 Churchill Avenue. They are 50 cents each. Stickers for store-bought brown paper biodegradable leaf bags are 25 cents each. Senior citizens pay 25 cents for leaf bags, up to a maximum of 40 bags. Leaf bag procedures

All leaves MUST be in brown paper recyclable leaf bags. LEAVES ONLY in the bags. Bags containing grass and/or other debris will be rejected. Bags need to be hand lifted onto the trucks so please limit the weight of each bag to 25 pounds. Curbside leaf bag collection

Leaf bags MUST have the Franklin Township logo or a Franklin Township leaf bag sticker on each bag, or the Township will not pick them up.

Leaves brought to the Convenience Center or Department of Public Works

Any brown paper recyclable leaf bag purchased from either the Township or from a retail store may be dropped off and replaced with a new bag at NO CHARGE. Leaves can be dropped off at 40 Churchill Avenue ONLY when open, Monday to Friday (except holidays), 7:15 a.m. - 2:45 p.m., and the Convenience Center (see times and dates above) and only from November to December 18.

CURBSIDE RECYCLING PROGRAM

Somerset County will continue the curbside recycling. Items need to be on the curb no later than 7 a.m. on collection day.

Items that should be recycled:

Plastics marked through (check the bottom of the container for these markings), corrugated cardboard (including pizza boxes), chipboard (cereal, cake mix and shoe boxes), newspapers, glass bottles, steel, bimetal and aluminum cans, paper, magazines and junk mail. Also recyclable: paper bags, paperback books, hardcover books (with hard covers removed), phone books, catalogs, bottles (water, soda, milk, juice, soap, shampoo); containers (peanut butter, yogurt, baby wipe containers, margarine tubs, clear plastic clamshell containers from salad bars). Items that should not be recycled: Polystyrene (Styrofoam °), plastics without numbers, plastic bags, microwave trays, motor oil or antifreeze bottles, plastic cups or plates or tableware, plastic flower pots, pesticide containers, paint buckets, beer balls, plastic coat hangers, plastic toys or furniture, batteries or fire extinguishers.
