#### **Important Election Dates**

**General Election Day:** Tuesday, November 7, 2023

Voter Registration Deadline - October 17, 2023

**Voter Registration** 

You must be a citizen of the United States; you must be 18 years of age on or before the day of the election & you must be a resident of your present address for at least 30 days before the election. Voter Registration Forms can be printed from the Township's website: www.franklintwpnj.org and must be received by the Township Clerk's Office or the Somerset County Board of Elections 21 days prior to Election Day.

#### **Voting by Mail-In Ballot**

You may vote by Mail-In-Ballot for any election. You do not need a reason. You must apply for a mail-in ballot by completing a *Mail-In Ballot Application*. Application Forms can also be obtained from the Somerset County Clerk's Office and the Franklin Township's Clerk Office. Mail-In Ballots are to be mailed to the County Clerk's Office postmarked by November 7, 2023 or placed in Drop Box at the Municipal Building by 8:00 p.m. on November 7, 2023. The County Clerk cannot accept faxes or electronic copies, as an original signature is required. You may apply in person at the County Clerk's office up to 3:00 p.m. on the day before the election.

#### **Early Voting**

Early Voting takes place from Saturday, October 28, 2023 through Sunday, November 5, 2023 at the Community/Senior Center located at 505 DeMott Lane, Somerset, NJ. Polls are open from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Monday thru Saturday and from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sunday. Anyone in Somerset County may vote at this polling location during this time period.

#### **Drop Box**

There is a Drop Box for Mail-In Ballots for all Somerset County municipalities located in front of the Municipal Building. The box will open approximately a month before Election Day and will remain open until 8:00 p.m. on November 7, 2023.

Senior/Disabled \$250 Deduction: Annual deduction of up to \$250 from property taxes for homeowners 65 or older or disabled who meet certain income and residency requirements.

Veteran \$250 Deduction: Annual deduction of up to \$250 from property taxes due for qualified war veterans or a veteran who served in peacekeeping missions and operations. This deduction also is available to a surviving spouse/civil union/domestic partner who has not remarried.

Property Tax Exemption for Disabled Veterans: Full exemption from property taxes on a principal residence for certain totally and permanently disabled war veterans and veterans who served in peacekeeping missions and operations. This exemption also is available to a surviving spouse/ civil union/domestic partner who has not remarried. The above benefit applications can be picked up at the Franklin Twp. Tax Assessor's Office.

Property Tax Reimbursement (Senior Freeze): State run program that allows seniors of 65 or older, or receiving federal Social Security disability benefit payments, who have lived in New Jersey for at least 10 years and who have their home for at least 3 years for a reimbursement for each year from the base year who meet certain income requirements. Affordable New Jersey Communities for Homeowners and Renters (ANCHOR): Applications are mailed to the property or can be requested by phone to 1(888) 238-1233. Homeowner must meet certain income and residency requirements to qualify for the credit against property taxes. Have you done work in your home and you didn't know (or weren't quite sure) you needed a construction permit? Or do you feel a prior owner did work without permits and you don't know what to do? If you answered yes to any of the

above, please stop by the Franklin Township Construction Department table at the FRANKLIN DAY FESTIVAL on Saturday, September 23, 2023 from 12:00 pm - 5:00 pm and talk to us about your concerns.

Here at the Construction Department, SAFETY is our primary goal! If it turns out that permits were required on a particular project done in your home, we will be offering amnesty on any penalties that may apply. In order to be eligible, you must register with us on Franklin Day, and you must apply for the appropriate permits by October 27, 2023.

Please remember that the amnesty program only applies to current Franklin Township homeowners for work done in their home and does not apply to any violations that have already been issued.

# The Center for Great Expectations: Hope...and so much more...Lives Here

In 1998, a scared, pregnant 17-year-old was desperately searching for help and a place to stay. She found The Center for Great Expectations (CGE) in the yellow pages of the phone book. She was one of 12 pregnant women and teens that Great Expectations opened its doors to that year. Initially, located in a little two-bedroom house in Somerville, The Center for Great Expectations broke ground in 2006 on construction for its twin buildings in Somerset that CGE, today, calls home.

The Center for Great Expectations is a multi-faceted, transformational agency whose residential program focuses on pregnant and parenting women and adolescents who find themselves caught in a generational cycle of trauma, abuse, and neglect. They do so with support from all facets of the community. In 2022, 17th District Assemblyman, Joseph Danielsen, garnered \$1,500,000 and another \$500,000 this year in support.

Celebrating its 25th Anniversary this year, Founder and CEO Peg Wright reflects back on those early days, "When we first opened our doors 25 years ago, while we provided women with a safe place while they were pregnant, we didn't have the room to take them back in once they had their babies. So, we would refer them to the local shelter in Somerville. It was sad; and it wasn't what we

wanted it to be. Offering a safe place, safe presence, and a safe path became our mission in 1998. As we have grown exponentially in 25 years, we have stayed true to that mission, something we are very proud of."

CGE's programs offer an opportunity that few programs make available to clients. For a pregnant woman or adolescent seeking help to overcome her substance use, only 26% of the treatment facilities in the country are willing to offer them treatment; and only 2% of all treatment facilities in the country welcome pregnant and parenting adolescents who want to stay with their young children while seeking treatment. As Peg explains, "At CGE, we believe – and have the data that demonstrates – it is essential to treat the mother and her baby or child together guiding the mothers

to learn how to build and sustain a relationship. Our society has grown in its awareness of the interconnectedness of physical and mental health. At Great Expectations, we have long embraced that understanding by creating a continuum of care leading to wellness and well-being for our women, men, and children."

As part of CGE's continuum of care, the organization now serves over 1,000 women, men and children annually in its relational programs which today include:

- Adult Women's Residential Mommy & Me Program in Somerset
- Adolescent Residential Treatment Program in Somerset
- Katy's Place Child Development Center, providing daily professional childcare for the children within the CGE community.
- Permanent Supportive Housing, providing apartments along with supportive services
- Roots to Recovery, an adult outpatient program
- START, which provides free in-home and telehealth therapeutic services for women with substance use disorder who are pregnant or postpartum.

CGE's impact and reach is extended through The Institute, CGE's consulting arm which collaborates with organizations and institutions, including schools and health care providers, to create a more attuned culture and provide clinical training. With the inauguration of the Institute, CGE now serves and trains individuals throughout the United States, while CGE's core programs operate in Hudson, Morris, Passaic, Essex, Middlesex and Somerset Counties, with clients coming from throughout New Jersey.

To mark its 25th Anniversary, The Center for Great Expectations will celebrate its, "Hope Lives Here" gala at The Marigold in Somerset on Friday, October 6. The event will bring together leaders, supporters and organizations that have been integral to CGE over the years. Among the honorees are:

- Outstanding Service Award: John & Linda Deitchman, Katy's Place
- Outstanding Volunteer Award: Dale Florio, Esq., Princeton Public Affairs Group.
- Humanitarian Award: Peg Wright, in recognition of her 25 years of leadership of CGE.

The ending to the young girl's story from 1998 is a perfect example of breaking the generational cycle of abuse. In 2021, her "baby" graduated from college. During graduation, she recognized another client from her time at CGE. Her "baby" was also receiving her diploma that day. CGE starts with hope but has moved well-beyond hope to become a national leader in providing transformational treatment for adults, children, and families impacted by adverse childhood events..



# Shade Tree Commission's Treemendous List Part 2 Franklin Township Recommended Evergreen and Coniferous Tree List

Are you planning to plant any trees in your yard this fall? Do you want to know which trees grow well in Franklin Township? This spring, the Shade Tree Commission published a list of over 140 deciduous trees recommended for our area. A list of over 30 evergreen and coniferous trees is now also available. The listed species enhance biodiversity, avoid monocultures, and are not known to be invasive. The lists include the trees' common and botanical names, general information about their expected mature height and width, whether they have any ornamental characteristics, and whether they are native to the area. Also on the website is a previously-published advisory list of trees to NOT plant in the Township. You can easily access all three lists under the resource section of the Shade Tree Commission website at https://www.franklintwpnj.org/shadetree.


**Right tree, right place!** To ensure the long-term success of any tree you plant, always confirm your specific site conditions match the selected tree's growing requirements.

While out and about town this spring and summer, you may have noticed numerous trees that appear to be suffering. Deciduous trees may be only partially leafed out; evergreen trees may show brown leaves and needles; others completely dead. While some of the dieback of deciduous trees is due to the invasive Emerald Ash Borer insect that attacks ash trees, much of the stress that trees are currently experiencing is due to last summer's drought. Young trees already stressed from the drought then faced one of the driest months of May on record. If you planted trees anytime in the past 3-5 years, it is critical that those trees receive adequate water.

Since their roots are still being established, young trees should get approximately 1.5" to 2" of water per week during the growing season. If nature doesn't supply enough rain, you should water your tree.

- To minimize evaporation, water in the early morning or early evening.
- A general rule of thumb is 10 gallons of water for each inch of trunk diameter over the course of a week or when the soil below the top 2" in the root zone is dry.
- It is better to water less often and more deeply.
- If any tree shows signs of stress such as wilting leaves, it should be watered deeply as soon as possible.
- Applying a 3" organic layer of mulch will also help your tree. Mulch regulates the soil temperature, slowing water evaporation from the soil. Just be careful not to pile the mulch against the trunk of the tree. Such "mulch volcanoes" can weaken and kill trees.

# Franklin Township Office of Emergency Management (OEM)

The Franklin Township Office of Emergency Management (OEM) was established through a Township Ordinance in compliance with state statutes. It is composed of a coordinator and three deputy coordinators who are appointed by the Mayor. Director Quovella Maeweather of the Franklin Township Police Department serves as the Coordinator and Sergeant Brian Farrar, Sergeant Kenneth Daly, and Detective Ronald Risden serve as Deputy Coordinators.

The main responsibility of the OEM is to organize, prepare, mitigate, and address any emergencies or catastrophes that may occur within the local area. To achieve this, the OEM works closely with the police department, fire departments, first aid squads, local community groups, and other local, county, state, and federal emergency response agencies.

The OEM regularly conducts drills and exercises with Somerset County and New Jersey Emergency Management Offices to ensure that Franklin Township is always prepared to effectively respond to any emergency.

#### Regulation of the Planting, **Growing or Cultivating** of Bamboo

Municipal Code Amendment Notification -**CHAPTER 222** 

Subject to certain exemptions set forth in Franklin Township Ordinance 4417-23, no persons, residents, citizens, property owners and/or tenants of the Township shall plant, cultivate, or cause to grow, any bamboo on any lot and/or parcel of ground within the geographic boundaries of the Township of Franklin, except for:

- A Where the root system of such bamboo plants is entirely contained within an above ground level planter, barrel, or other above ground vessel of such design, material and location as to entirely prevent the spread of growth of the bamboo plants' root system beyond the container in which it is planted;
- B. Whether planted or growing in a container, as described herein, all bamboo plants shall be located, trimmed and maintained so that no part of the plant shall be closer than 10 feet from any property line.

§ 222-27 Exemptions. This chapter shall not apply to any landowner or possessor who, prior to the effective date of this chapter, has planted or caused to grow bamboo on any property within the Township limits unless the Zoning Officer, or his or her designee, determines that any portion of such bamboo has been allowed to grow upon, extend roots across, or extend branches, stalks or leaves over any public way or any private property not owned by or in the possession of such land owner, tenant, or any possessor of said land.

In the event Bamboo is located upon any property within the Township of Franklin, the owner and occupant of said property shall jointly and severally be required to confine such species to prevent encroachment, spread, invasion or intrusion of same onto any other private or public property or public right-ofway. In lieu of confining the species, the property owner or occupant may elect to totally remove the bamboo from the property. Failure to properly confine such bamboo shall require removal as set forth below. The cost of said removal shall be at the bamboo property occupant and owner's expense.

# Burn Smart, Burn Safe

A Message About Safe Burning Practices from Franklin Township Fire Prevention Department and the United States Environmental Protection Agency

id you know that by changing the way you burn wood you can save money, reduce air pollution and protect your health?

Here are a few simple tips to make your fire burn hotter, keep your wallet fatter and keep your local air cleaner and healthier.

- Season all firewood. All firewood should be split, securely covered or stored, and aged for at least six months. Seasoned wood burns hotter, cuts fuel consumption and reduces the amount of smoke your appliance produces.
- Choose the right firewood. Hardwoods are the best. Never burn trash or treated wood which can emit toxic air pollutants
- Start it right. Use only clean newspaper or dry kindling to start a fire. Never use gasoline, kerosene, charcoal starter, or a propane torch.
- Don't let the fire smolder. Many people think they should let a fire smolder overnight. But reducing the air supply does little for heating and increases air pollution.

- Clean ashes from your wood-burning appliance. Excess ashes can clog the air intake vents reducing efficiency. Be sure to dispose of ashes in a metal container away from the house or any flammable material to
- Keep your chimney clean. A clean chimney provides good draft for your wood-burning appliance and reduces the risk of a chimney fire. Have a certified professional inspect your chimney once a year
- Be a good neighbor. Follow best practices for burning wood. Always remember to comply with state and local codes and check your local air quality forecast.
- Follow instructions. Operate your woodburning appliance according to the manufacturer's instructions and follow all maintenance procedures
- Upgrade to cleaner equipment. EPAcertified wood stoves and fireplace inserts burn cleaner and burn wood more efficiently emitting less particle pollution than older
- ( Size matters. Choose the right-sized appliance for your needs. If your woodburning appliance is too big for your room or house, the fuel will smolder and create more air

#### **Outdoor Fires & Open Burning**



Outdoor fires in custom built fireplaces/fire pits or commercially manufactured devices such as outdoor fireplaces, fire bowls and chimineas are very popular in backyards today. Although their use is allowed under the NJ State Fire Code, there are restrictions that residents must comply with. Adhering to these requirements and the manufacturer's safety tips will assure a safe and enjoyable outdoor experience.

- An approved outdoor fire is classified as a fire taking place on a residential property for the sole purpose of providing warmth or recreation and is contained within an approved device.
- The fire cannot exceed three (3) feet in diameter and two (2) feet in height.
- The fuel for outdoor fires is restricted to seasoned fire wood, natural gas or
- The burning of leaves, trash, rubbish, yard waste or construction materials is considered Open Burning and is prohibited by the NJ State Fire Code.
- Outdoor fires should be at least 15-feet from a structure.
- Outdoor fires should not be used during high wind conditions.
- Fireplaces should be located on a non-combustible surface such as a brick or concrete patio.
- The fire must be attended at all times. The fire should be extinguished prior to leaving the area.
- Never use a flammable or combustible liquid to start or rekindle a fire.
- Prior to removing ashes, allow them to cool for at least twenty four (24) hours; then place the ashes in a metal waste can with a tight fitting metal lid and keep it away from the house or any structure.

Currently these medical services, including the more recently added dental services, are provided to all district students at the mobile clinic located on the Hamilton Street Campus of Franklin Middle School. We are, however, working with the Township Council toward the ultimate goal of building a dedicated facility on that campus affording Zufall the ability to provide even more services to a broader population. Preparations are also moving along for our staff health center on Veronica Avenue, which is on schedule to open this Fall.

#### District Behavioral Threat Assessment and Management Teams

On August 1, 2022, Governor Phil Murphy signed into legislation, N.J.S.A. 18A:17-43.4, requiring the establishment of threat assessment teams in public, charter, and renaissance school projects beginning in the 23-24 school year. The goal of the threat assessment process is to prevent acts of violence before they start. The purpose of a threat assessment team is to provide school teachers, administrators, and other staff with assistance in: identifying students with behaviors of concern; assessing those students' risk for engaging in violence or other harmful activities; and delivering intervention strategies to manage the risk of harm for students who pose a potential safety risk.

Through the threat assessment process, we hope to identify students who may be on a "pathway to violence" and provide them with the resources and support they need to adapt to a safe, healthy, and productive lifestyle. Reducing and preventing acts of violence in our schools is part of the formula that ensures that all students have a safe and secure environment in which to learn and grow.

The threat assessment teams' purpose is also to prevent targeted violence in the school and to ensure a safe and secure school environment that enhances the learning experience for all members of the school community.

To be clear, the need to conduct a behavioral threat assessment is based on a set of observable behaviors exhibited by an individual that present safety related concerns. These behaviors include, but are not limited to: student journal entries focusing on violence, destruction, or death; a pattern of physical aggressive behavior or bullying; threats to or the act of bringing a weapon to school; social media posts with threat messaging; exhibiting or threatening self harm; deliberate acts of vandalism or the destruction of property; desire to hurt/kill things; dramatic changes in behavior; drug use; uncontrollable anger or rage or similar alarming or disturbing behavior.

The determination to conduct a behavior threat assessment for a student is not punitive. By identifying students who exhibit concerning behavior such as the behaviors in the examples above, we may provide needed resources and support services to the student/family. A mechanism to report concerning or alarming behaviors will be in place at the beginning of the school year and shared with the student families of Franklin Township Public Schools.

#### **Curriculum & Instruction Corner**

The Office of Curriculum & Instruction (C&I) is responsible for identifying, developing, and implementing learning activities for approximately 7500 students in the Franklin Township Public Schools, including General Education, Special Education, Gifted & Talented, Academic Support Instruction, and Emergent Bilingual learners in grades Pre-K to 12. To help make this possible, the C&I Office is composed of 14 Supervisors and Directors who work with administrators, coaches, and teachers across the district to develop programs of study for its students.

Led by Assistant Superintendent Daniel Loughran, Ed.D, the C&I Office has created outstanding learning opportunities in recent years, and it continues to develop programs, partnerships, and core course curricula that not only help students master the New Jersey Department of Education's mandated learning standards but also to build a foundation for career and college pathways for all learners.

Recent partnerships we created and implemented for our students include the Invention Competition, supported by the Sodhani Foundation. In addition to the many STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, math) learning opportunities available to students across all grade levels in the Franklin Township Public Schools, 2023 marked our second year of providing additional enrichment for our students in grades 3-5 via the district's Invention Competition, sponsored generously by the Sodhani Foundation, whose Mission and Vision is to help people in need receive education, food, and medical help. The Sodhani Foundation vision is to uplift and give back to society at large, bringing the community together in a holistic manner by establishing a cultural heritage and upholding a shared vision of friendship, peace, and harmony. Sodhani's foundation develops entrepreneurship in youth and instills in them the instinct of giving.

At the elementary level, the fifth-grade team from Franklin Park -- Aditya Jagan Mohan, Vincy Khared, and Charlise

Kraus -- placed third, with "Compost Garbage Bin," that truly impressed judges and audience members, not only for its engineering qualities but also for the team's thoughtful, well-rehearsed presentation. This year's runner up at the elementary level, the fourth-grade team from Pine Grove Manor -- Thania Cancino-Castro & Camila Gomez-Rosado -- demonstrated their neat "Jelly-O-Cleaner," which provoked smiles and head nods among audience members. The elementary-level champion for 2023, Conerly Road School's fifth-graders -- Savannah Sewnarine, Amari Montas, Vihaan Patel -- presented "PCB," a filtering process that mimics the chemosynthesis that Tube Worms use for food production. Chemosynthesis is the process by which food is made by bacteria or other living things using chemicals as the energy source, typically in the absence of sunlight. In this case, the team demonstrated how "PCB," Process Chemosynthesis Biomimicry, enabled their invention to mimic that of the Tube Worm's to provide an environmentally-friendly process for cleaning lakes and other bodies of water. As impressive as the scientific research that factored into the presentation was, it was equally clear that the team had rehearsed its presentation carefully, and the audience was delighted

to see and hear this smoothly-delivered, compelling "pitch." At the middle school level, teams from the Hamilton Street and Sampson G. Smith campuses contributed their inventions in response to a footwear design challenge. Hamilton Street's eighth-grade team -- Alex Ayona-Ramos, Amani Berry, and Yaroslav Reshotka -- was recognized for its "Magic Shoe" invention, while Sampson G. Smith's eighthgrade team -- Victor Garcia, Himanshu Singh, Raghunandana Thammineni, Athanasios Voudouris, Jayden Whyte -- was honored for its "Renew Run" invention.

While the Invention Competition will continue within the district in future years, it is the district's goal, in partnership with the Sodhani Foundation, to enter student inventions into statewide and national competitions in the near future, including at the New Jersey School Boards Association's annual STEAM Tank competition.

The C & I Office also supports and helps develop enrichment experiences in the schools, including various field trips, assemblies, and even guest author opportunities when possible. For example, this

year we were able to host four noted authors for our students, at the elementary, middle school, and high school levels. Notably, New York Times Bestselling Author Jason Reynolds visited with all eighth grade students via a webinar in March; National bestselling author Jessica Bruder, who wrote Nomadland, the source material for the film that would earn the Best Picture at the 2021 Academy Awards; award-winning bilingual author Alexandra Alessandri; and who penned smART, a NY Times Bestseller that was featured on CBS Mornings with Gayle King. In each of these presentations, our teacher leaders worked to ensure that our students did not merely hear a lecture, but instead were invited to interact with the material and the authors directly, which they did and found the experiences moving and potentially life changing.
