Celebrating Autism Acceptance Month


Care, Share, Aware Returns

BIG CHANGES COMING TO THE LIBRARY

To serve the community better and to provide a safe and comfortable environment for visitors, the library will be embarking on two major projects during this spring. Given the scope of these projects, some library services may be impacted. Further details are listed below.

GALLERY ROOF PANEL REPLACEMENTS


The panels on the gallery roof are being replaced with new panels that will be insulated to prevent heat loss in the winter and excessive build up in the summer months. The new panels will also do a better job of diffusing light on sunny days. This gallery project started around April 9, 2024. There will be two phases, with work beginning at the back of the gallery and moving towards the front doors. The entire project is estimated to last approximately two months.


The library will remain open throughout the project. Visitors should expect limitations to various library services as the roofing progresses. Impacts include but are not limited to:

- The Community Room will be unavailable for public programs.
- New Arrivals, DVDs, Blu-rays, and Manga/Graphic Novels will temporarily be located at the front of the nonfiction collection, right around the corner from their previous location.
- Both silent study rooms will be unavailable for the duration of the
- There will be restricted access to the library's Fiction and Large Type collections.
- Restrooms will be inaccessible during phase II of the project.
- The front entrance to the library will be closed during the second phase. Visitors will be able to enter the building through the doors located to the right and left of the front of the building.
- As always, residents will be welcome at the library's two other full-service branches during this time.

New Library Software

The library will be implementing a new library software system to improve service. With this new system, library patrons will be able to:







- Select a preferred pickup location from any participating library location.
- Change their communication preferences to be contacted via email or text.
- See library locations integrated with Google Maps.


The new library software system also supports behind-the-scenes library operations such as cataloging, acquisitions, patron records, and more. The library's investment in this project reflects its commitment to serving the community.

The final leg of this project will begin on May 7, 2024. During this time, many library services will be unavailable including, but not limited to:

- Patron accounts
- Holds
- Fine payments

Due dates will be extended to reflect this period of limited accessibility. We expect all library services to resume on May 15, 2024.

We appreciate the public's patience as library staff work to provide the best possible service at the library. Your Shade Tree Commission Update

Tree Maintenance: What can you do to prepare your trees for a healthy season? The Arbor Day Foundation has a great list of tips at https://www.arborday.org/trees/tips including:

- 1. Check Your Trees: Your deciduous trees should all be leafing out or budding, and your evergreens, well, should be green. During your early summer inspection, look for the following:
 - Cankers (dead sections of bark on branches or tree trunks)
 - Oozing sap (trees eject sap to cover and protect wounds)
 - Signs of infestation (adult beetle exit holes)
 - Signs of disease (blackened and curled twigs)
 - Structure (odd, crossed, or unwanted growth patterns)
- **2. Provide Water for Your Trees:** Water is the most important thing for healthy tree growth.
 - Soil around the tree should be well-drained (doesn't pool up and stay)
 - Soil should be consistently moist to the touch (not wet)
 - Deep water your tree once weekly (let the water soak to a depth of 12 to 15-inches, this encourages roots to grow deep)
 - Use soaker hoses or buckets to irrigate your trees (buckets with holes drilled in the bottom are great for deep waterings)

Tip: Increase watering frequency during times of drought and decrease it in unusually wet times.

- **3. Mulch Your Trees & Gardens:** Applying mulch to your trees and garden helps regulate both soil temperature and moisture. Here's how to do it right:
 - Apply a 3 to 6-inch layer of mulch to the entire area within the dripline of your trees (needles, wood chips, or compost)
 - Keep mulch pulled back 2 to 3-inches from the tree trunk (this avoids excess moisture and insect trouble around the root flare)
 - When the mulch compresses, fluff it up and add more when needed
- **4. Plant Lots of New Trees:** Early spring is a great time to plant a tree. Both evergreens and deciduous trees will be coming into their growing season and have the time to "harden" new growth before the arrival of the next winter season. Observe the following:
 - Determine the proper tree species by your USDA hardiness zone map and our Frankling Township Recommended Tree List at https://www.franklintwpnj.org/committees-commissions/shade-tree-commission/resources/trees-to-plant
 - Determine which species is the right tree in the right location https://www.arborday.org/trees/index-choosing.cfm

What's that little blue tag on my tree? During a survey of trees along roadways that was done in 2018, trees were tagged with numbered blue metal badges to help keep track of which ones became infested with Emerald Ash Borer beetles. If you take down a tree with a blue badge, or if you see one that has fallen, please call the Township Department of Public Works so that the inventory can be updated. Do not cut down a tree with a blue badge until you check with the DPW at (732)873-7299. IMPORTANT - Before trimming or cutting a tree: Is there a tree along the side or front of your property that you were thinking of trimming or removing? Please make sure that it isn't a Township-Owned Tree to avoid any issues. Trees near public roadways, parks, schools, and other Township owned areas can only be trimmed or removed by Township DPW professionals. How do you know if it's your tree or not? Just call the Township and a crew will come out and check. Call (732)873-7299 and the DPW will be happy to help!

Flood Safety Tips

- **Do not walk through flowing water.** Drowning is the number one cause of flood deaths. Currents are deceptive; six inches of moving water knocks you off your feet.
- **Do not drive through a flooded area.** More people drown in their cars than anywhere else. Do not drive around road barriers, the road or bridge may be washed out.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. The number two cause of death after drowning is electrocution. Report downed power lines to the utility company.
- Turn off your electricity. Some appliances keep electrical charges even after they have been unplugged. Don't use appliances that have gotten wet unless they have been cleaned and dried.
- Look out for animals, especially snakes. Small animals flooded out of their homes may seek shelter in yours. Turn things over with a stick before picking them up.
- Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors are covered with debris. Mud-covered can be very slippery.
- Avoid wading through the flood water. Oils, chemicals and even raw sewage mix with flood waters creating unsanitary and even hazardous conditions.
- Be alert for gas leaks. Use a flashlight to inspect for damage. Don't smoke, use candles or open flames unless you know for sure that the gas has been turned off and the area ventilated.

Since 1977, when The Meadows was formed to steward the Van Duyn-Van Wickle House, many members of our community worked selflessly to restore and maintain historic sites in Franklin Township. The Board of Directors would like to thank the many donors, Somerset County Cultural and Heritage Commission, the Franklin Township Mayor & Council, and Department of Public Works who have, over the years, made it possible for us perform this service to our community.

To celebrate and help prepare for this golden anniversary, we invite you to participate in our time capsule project! The Meadows is pleased to announce that it is putting together this unique endeavor for those who live, work, go to school, or recreate in the area, or are interested in making their historical mark. The time capsule will be opened in 2077 – fifty years from when it is sealed. This will coincide with the 100th anniversary of The Meadows. Between the times it is sealed and opened, the time capsule will be on display for all to see, in person or online, with a group photo and the names of participants.

Why is this time capsule unique? YOU. The capsule will be made up of smaller capsules, which may be purchased by you – as individuals, families, groups, or organizations. Each capsule purchase entitles the purchaser to tips, tricks, and suggestions of what to include for a successful time capsule, two tickets to the sealing party to be held in January of 2027, and two tickets to the opening party in January of 2077. "Don't let fear or shame keep you from seeking the help you need!"

That is one of the messages that the recently formed Franklin Township Stigma Free Council hopes to spread across our community. In a groundbreaking initiative, Franklin Township, in conjunction with the Mayor's Wellness Campaign, is joining the fight against mental health stigma and substance use




disorder (SUD) stigma. One of the Council's missions is to encourage individuals, businesses, schools, non-profits, public safety personnel, houses of worship, and more to commit to being stigma-free. Creating communities of care and support is easy, and the benefits are immeasurable. Whether an individual or an established organization, small steps can make a big impact. Supporters can sign the Franklin Township Stigma-Free Pledge, support community education about stigma, and/or share and post reputable resources from organizations like NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness), New Jersey MentalHealthCares, and SAMHSA (Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration).

Among the many goals that the Council has identified are:

• Make it easier for residents to know where to turn for help, by posting resources on the Franklin Township website, our libraries, food

bank, businesses, and other key locations.



- Support all youth, but especially those who appear isolated, struggling emotionally, acting out behaviorally or are going through high stress/trauma/grief situations.
- Publicize the school, youth center, 4-H, scouting, faith-based programs that already exist so more youth can take advantage of them.
- Offer programs for parents to understand how to determine if a child/teen needs professional assessment, and how to talk to kids about their concerns.
- Create safe spaces for people with mental health or substance issues to get together and receive peer-to-peer support.
- Find solutions for our senior citizens who are isolated, dealing with depression and anxiety, but often do not know where to turn for help.
- Implement best practices from around the state about what works to reduce stigma.
- Create and publish personal narratives about how stigma interfered with recovery and/or the road to health as a way to reduce stigma.
- Engage representatives from our diverse community in the effort since it is true that stigma can be stronger in some cultures than others.

As one can see from the list above, these are significant and challenging goals, and they won't be achieved overnight, but steps have been taken since the first meeting in February. Check out the following:

- Resource sharing and education about stigma by volunteers at the St Matthias
 Health Fair (youth driven event) in March and the Franklin Twp. Public Schools
 Diversity night May 3.
- Adult Mental Health First Aid Training has been scheduled for June 10, 2024. Youth Mental Health First Aid Training has been scheduled for September 30, 2024.
- Nita Velanki and Donna Sozio spoke passionately at the April 25 Franklin
 Township Board of Education meeting about the harm of stigma and asked the
 BOE to approve a resolution pledging to strive to reduce stigma in our schools.
- Lit up the Franklin Twp. Gazebo in green* for May-Mental Health Awareness month in conjunction with Mental Health Assn. of New Jersey.
- Franklin Twp. Council issued a proclamation for May is Mental Health Awareness month, renewing its commitment to a stigma-free community.
- Commendations for teens from Franklin Township who have initiated mental health and stigma awareness events were issued to students from Franklin High School, St. Matthias and Thomas Edison

Energysmart Charter School at the May 14 Franklin Township Council Meeting.

*Why green, you might ask? Green is often associated with concepts like new life, renewal and growth in nature. This symbolism is intended to represent the idea that people with mental health and substance use

disorder challenges can experience recovery, healing and personal growth.

The Summer months are fast approaching which means more of us will be outside!

These sunny days are also a greater chance to encounter wildlife. Franklin Township is home to many species of wildlife from raccoons to coyotes. Wildlife in general, do not want to interact with humans and will flee. Below are some tips and general information to happily coexist with wildlife.

Tips to keep wildlife out of your yard!

- Cover garbage/clean up after outside dining. Wildlife will be attracted to any food source. Bird feeders will attract wildlife and bring them closer to your home.
- **DO NOT** feed outdoor cats! This is one of the biggest issues that not only results in a larger feral cat population but will attract wildlife.
- Plan out your garden! The use of chicken wire or fencing will help keep wildlife away.
 A nice garden is a big attraction for wildlife.

What to do if you see wildlife in your yard!

- There is no need to call the police or animal control to report wildlife passing through a yard or crossing the street. Fox, raccoons, possum, and even coyotes are native to Somerset.
- At times some animals that are normally nocturnal will come out during the day.
 Especially after a big rainfall or other inclement weather. If the animal is circling, wobbling, foaming/excessive saliva from the mouth or falling down call Animal Control or after hours the Franklin Township Police.
- If wildlife becomes a nuisance to your property such as a groundhog digging holes it is the responsibility of the property owner to have them removed via a licensed Wildlife Control Removal Service. More information on wildlife relocation can be found on The NJ Division of Fish and Wildlife website. https://dep.nj.gov/njfw/
- Wildlife that may enter the home such as a bird in a stove vent or raccoons in a crawl space must be removed by a licensed wildlife control removal service.
- If wildlife is in distress/injured and cannot flee Animal Control will intervene. This
 excludes deer. The Franklin Township Police Department should be contacted at
 732-873-5533
- Deer carcass removal is set up by Franklin Township Police Department NOT Animal Control.

Property Tax Relief Programs

Senior/Disabled \$250 Deduction: Annual deduction of up to \$250 from property taxes for homeowners 65 or older or disabled who meet certain income and residency requirements. This benefit application can be picked up at the Tax Assessor's Office.



Veteran \$250 Deduction: Annual deduction of up to \$250 from property taxes due

forqualified war veterans or a veteran who served in peacekeeping missions and operations. This deduction is also available to a surviving spouse/civil union/domestic partner who has not remarried. This benefit application can be picked up at the Tax Assessor's Office.

Property Tax Exemption for Disabled Veterans: Full exemption from property taxes on a principal residence for certain totally and permanently disabled war veterans and veterans who served in peacekeeping missions and operations. This exemption is also available to a surviving spouse/civil union/domestic partner who has not remarried. This benefit application can be picked up at the Tax Assessor's Office.

Property Tax Reimbursement (Senior Freeze): State run program that allows seniors, 65 or older, or receiving federal Social Security disability benefit payments, who have lived in New Jersey for at least 10 years and who have owned their home for at least 3 years for a reimbursement for each year from the base year who meet certain income requirements. This reimbursement will be in the form of a check to the applicant. For an application please call 1(800) 882-6597 or visit

Affordable New Jersey Communities for Homeowners and Renters (ANCHOR):

Applications are mailed to the property or can be requested by phone to 1(888) 238-1233. Homeowner must meet certain income and residency requirements to qualify for the credit against property taxes. Eligibility requirements can be accessed at https://www.state.nj.us/treasury/taxation/anchor/index.shtml.

MAKE-UPS: Make-ups are only offered for programs cancelled by the Recreation Dept. due to weather or other circumstances. In some instances, credits will be issued in lieu of makeup classes. Make-ups are not given for absences.

FEES: ALL PAYMENTS MUST BE RECEIVED UPON REGISTRATION. Program fees are not prorated for late registrations RESIDENCY: All fees listed are for Township residents. The Sky's the Limit for FHS Aviation Students

It was a beautiful spring afternoon on the campus of Franklin High School, with just enough wind to keep things interesting. Students from the Aviation Club and the Introduction to Aviation course took their places holding on to ropes as the hot air balloon and basket settled before "flight." Next, the students, as well as several district staff members and guests, took their turns alongside balloon pilot Keith Sproul to rise over fifty feet, well above the roof of the school. As they returned to the ground several minutes later, the next set of travelers stood ready to carefully swap places with those in the basket. "What a great opportunity," said one of the observers that day.

Opportunity is a word often associated with the Aviation Program at Franklin High School which began as an afterschool club during the 20/21 school year. At that time approximately 12 students met with their advisor and were able to practice simulated flight experiences using authentic flight simulation software. Working with pilot Khaled Chebli, a driving force behind the Program, students were given the



opportunity to take to the skies and take over the controls of a plane themselves. Since then the Program has provided some students the opportunity to gain valuable flight time which is necessary to earn a pilot's license. One student from that first group, Cyprianni Stewart, FHS Class of 2022, was able to earn his private pilot's license while attending FHS. Mr. Stewart has gone on to study at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University where he has been able to "truly dive head first into my craft." He has continued his training with a single mindedness that has led to his now becoming, at the age of 20, an Instrument rated Commercial Pilot, Certified Flight Instructor and Advanced Ground Instructor. He says this about the Aviation Club, "Joining the Aviation Club has been undoubtedly one of the most influential and important decisions I've ever made in my life. I mean this wholeheartedly when I say, I would absolutely not be where I am in life had I not joined the Aviation Club."

Today's Aviation Club continues to influence students. It is "an enthusiastic student-led group where students come together to share their love for aviation and learn from each other," says the club's current advisor Sarah Montanari. The Club's executive board and Ms. Montanari plan their meetings which feature activities such as paper airplane aerodynamics challenges; a plane accident investigation escape room: field trips and guest speaker events which have included pilots from major airlines and the military as well as aerospace engineers. "Every single aviation industry professional I have met so far over the past two years has been enthusiastic about working with students to introduce them to aviation," says Montanari.

New in the 23/24 school year is the Introduction to Aviation class, which is the first course in a proposed 4-year high school STEM curriculum. The course focus is to introduce students to careers in aviation, the history and principles of aerodynamics, and engineering design. Ms. Montanari, an English teacher who completed additional course training in order to teach the class, describes it as, "a really fun hands-on class in which students often collaborate in teams to complete aerospace investigations. Some of our investigations have challenged students to build and launch their own hot air balloons, design heavy lift rockets, and construct and test wind tunnels and airfoils."

Ms. Montanari's enthusiasm for aviation and her students is impressive. She is pursuing her own pilot's license having passed the FAA Private Pilot Knowledge test. Her next step is to begin flight training this summer. Ms. Montanari is also pursuing an Advanced Ground Instructor certificate, which she says, "will improve my instruction and allow me to offer more to our students." She has this to say about her current students, "I have to shout out



the phenomenal accomplishments of our students so far this year: six of our students in the class/club are actively in-flight training; one of our students is currently interning at Central Jersey Airport; next year, one of our seniors will be attending a college engineering program while another senior will be attending Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University for aerospace or aeronautics. Some of our students have also applied for prestigious aviation summer programs."

So, what is next for the Program? For now, the second year of the aviation curriculum has been approved for next school year. But when Ms. Montanari looks to the future, she envisions a four-year program; dual enrollment college credit; a drone pilot component; and much, much more.

After all, for this program at FHS, it looks like the sky's the limit.

FHS Filmmakers Meet The Challenge

Picture it. A room filled with your peers: a stage; a podium; an announcer who says... [drumroll please] "The best film award goes to....."

These are the words that filmmakers everywhere long to hear, as these words signify recognition for their work, their art and in many cases, the embodiment of their dreams,

Members of the Franklin High School Aspects of Video Program were able to hear those words on March 21, 2024 when Robin Kampf, digital media producer at the New Jersey School Boards Association [NJSBA] announced that their film, The Challenge, had won in the New Jersey Hometown Documentary Short category in the globally recognized Garden State Film Festival. The announcement was made at a student workshop in Asbury Park at the beginning of the Festival.

The workshop at the Garden State Film Festival was such a great experience," explains PJ Bracco, television and film production teacher at Franklin High School. "We were sitting in a room filled with around 400 students and

filmmakers from all over the state, listening to some of the top people that facilitate the business of filmmaking in NJ." Then, the students' reaction when we found out we won the award, "that was classic! Everyone kind of jumped and started screaming. It was truly exciting."

Mr. Bracco, a film producer and director in his own right, has taught at Franklin High School [FHS] for two years. He has been attending the Festival since 2012, both as a filmmaker, with work featured in the Festival, and as a supporter of independent films. Having a film chosen to air at the Festival in the

High School Films Category is significant in itself and Mr. Bracco recalls when the student who had submitted the film was able to share that news with his classmates, "Aryan was beside himself," Mr. Bracco continues, "I remember telling the class, 'This is when it all starts... you're filmmakers!"

The Challenge is a behind the scenes look at a master video class which took place in November of 2023 in collaboration with the students of Linden High School. Michael Pinnix, veteran television and production teacher at FHS who is also a filmmaker by trade, explains, "Every year our Aspects of Video class participates in various Master Classes on video production. This Master Class challenged our students to collaborate with students who they did not know, to work in teams: write; film; edit and finalize a short film...in three hours." The results of that day were three short films. The behind the scenes footage of that day, along with much more editing, interviews and a voice-over script became the mini documentary, The Challenge. "Inspired by an already successful workshop where they put their heart and soul all into creating films, they took that to create something new, something different and told a story about the story," said Mr. Bracco.

That story fit well with the criteria of the NJ Hometown Documentary Short award, which is sponsored by the NJSBA. As a mini documentary that tells a story having to do with the hometown of the student(s) and which focuses on some aspect of the arts, music, history, culture, a person or place, The Challenge will be featured at the NJSBA Workshop in Atlantic City this fall. The award also included a prize of \$500 for the Aspects of Video Program.

Franklin Township Public School Students Show Their Smiles

Franklin Township Public School students had the opportunity to smile a little brighter this school year thanks to services and special events provided by Zufall Health and two chapters of the not for profit organization, the Links, Inc.

Zufall Health is in its second year of partnership with FTPS. The organization provides medical and more recently, dental services to district students through their school based mobile health center. This vehicle, which is equipped with exam rooms and necessary medical equipment, visits the Hamilton Street Campus of Franklin Middle School [HSC] twice a week. The

majority of students seen at the health center attend the Hamilton Street Campus, but students from all district schools can be seen by appointment. This year a total of 603 appointments were made, serving 300 individuals.

The majority of the appointments this year were for physicals and vaccinations. But Zufall Health also offered dental services and was able to provide 100 dental appointments to students. Zufall Health also sponsored a special event at HSC in conjunction with Give Kids a Smile Day in February. At that event, 22 students were signed up for dental services, which could include a screening, cleaning and/or fluoride treatment. Other students at the event were provided education activities around oral health at the Hamilton Street Campus.

Student families in all district schools are encouraged to learn about Zufall Health and utilize their medical and dental services. President & Chief Executive Officer of Zufall Health, Frances Palm says, "In our second year of school-based care at the Franklin School District, Zufall Health continues to deliver high quality, affordable health care services to the district's students and families, regardless of income or insurance." Ms. Palm continues, "School-based care is a win for everyone! It reduces barriers for busy families related to transportation, missing work, and disruptions to learning. Most importantly, our partnership allows students to focus on their education and healthy development, all within the safe, convenient location of the school district community. We look forward to improving health/educational outcomes for the district students and continuing to serve the Franklin community."

That Franklin community will continue to grow. Through a partnership between Zufall Health, the Township, and the school district, plans are underway to construct a permanent free-standing school-based health center building adjacent to the Hamilton Street Campus. When that location is opened, it will be available to not only Franklin students but all community members.

"The construction of the permanent health center, during this next phase of our partnership with Zufall Health, will provide a great resource for our students and all of their family members," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. John Ravally.

Earlier this school year, some 758 students from the district's seven elementary schools were given a dental screening in the Colgate Dental Van through the Bright Smiles, Bright Futures Program. This program was a collaborative effort of the Central Jersey and Raritan Valley Chapters of The Links, Inc. The Links, Inc. is an international, not-for-profit corporation and one of the nation's oldest and largest volunteer service organizations with a mission to enrich, sustain, and ensure the culture and economic survival of African Americans and other persons of African ancestry.

"There are ongoing disparities and inequities in oral health among adults and children. We wanted to teach youth about proper oral care. The Bright Smiles, Bright Futures program provides Links chapters the opportunity to impact their communities by: helping families become knowledgeable on how oral health affects the body; providing children free education and screenings, via their partnership with Colgate Palmolive - Colgate Dental Van; providing families referrals to dentists willing to provide services for free and/or at nominal costs and helping families become knowledgeable about how diet affects dental care," explained Constance Pizzaro, The Links representative.

Ms. Pizzaro worked with Ms. Quiyon Peters, Supervisor of School Counseling K-8 and together with school principals and District Head Nurse Terri Giorgianni and Assistant Head Nurse Kim McNee, they put this "Dental Van Tour" of the district's elementary schools on the road.

Ms. Peters commented, "I was elated to support the coordination of the program to ensure our elementary school aged students and families had "access" to the services provided." She continued, "Students' health can definitely impact their academic and personal / social growth."

What did the students think? Ms. Peters observed, "Some were a little reserved at first but after being received with warmth, care and explanation of the screenings, they participated and enjoyed the experience. Many asked, 'When are you guys coming back?""



Maybe as soon as next fall as plans are underway to bring the organization back next school year. Ms. Pizarro states, "My hope for the event in the future is that we are able to engage more students. The earlier you expose children to good dental habits, you have a greater chance that they will continue throughout their lifetime. They will also teach others, like their peers and their parents."

And that is definitely something to smile about.

FTPS Leaders Strengthen Their Community with Restorative Practices

Over the past two years, Franklin Township Public Schools has added restorative practices to their teachers' tool box. The strategies of this approach provide a way for teachers and administrators to better connect with their students, provide their students with a better sense of belonging, and address student behavior issues in a positive way.

Put very simply, using this approach, teachers proactively develop relationships and build a community in their classroom. All community members come together to establish agreements with the rights and responsibilities of the community members defined. When an individual does not abide by the agreement, the teacher will ask questions to determine the reason behind the behavior and try to refocus the student. This response may also include others in the community who will listen with empathy, explain how the behavior of that individual has impacted them, and the community at large, and offer suggestions. An emphasis on shared expectations allows students to feel comfortable expressing how they feel. At times the behavior may also be addressed with the participation of an administrator or the student's family.

The Student Code of Conduct now outlines how this approach can be used to address the different levels of student offenses and staff members have been invited to participate in Professional Learning Communities which focus on this approach. This year and going forward, these staff members will become leaders and share their knowledge with their colleagues during professional development sessions and faculty meetings.

Let's hear from some of those leaders on what they think of this approach.

"Restorative practices allow us to find new ways for students' voices to be heard and validated as well as provide opportunities for students to learn and grow rather than receive negative consequences," said Angela Pape, Vice Principal of Claremont Elementary School.

"Restorative practices provide a way for students to understand how their actions and behaviors affect others and themselves," adds teacher Cynthia Gaspar of Pine Grove Manor School.

"Restorative practices have given our students an opportunity to share their voice and develop empathy for each other," explains Corey Cohen, Hamilton Street Campus Dean of Students.

"Learning about restorative practices helps us, not just as an educator but as an empathetic human being!" adds Samantha Lewis, teacher at Pine Grove Manor School [PGM].


Added benefits of using the approach include more open student discussions in class, noted PGM teacher Jodi Dawson and additional insights into the student's lives, mentioned another PGM teacher Lorena Gonzalez.

Finally, PGM Principal Genesi Miles describes the use of the restorative practices this way, "Restorative practices have impacted how I, the school administrator, and other school team members communicate and seek to understand students. We get ahead of any issues by forging relationships with students. This lays the foundation for us to be able to confront students and have honest conversations when challenges arise."

The district is tracking how the implementation of Restorative Practices will impact school discipline data. Early reports indicate that Restorative Practices has decreased the number of office disciplinary referrals, that is behavior which results in the student being sent to see an administrator.













Moving On - But Leaving a Legacy Behind




Several of our seasoned district staff are retiring at the end of this school year. We asked some of them to reflect on their role as educators, on how their programs have changed over the years and on their plans for the future.

The leaders of the district's Army Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps [JROTC] - Major (Ret.) Jacqueline Vazquez and Sergeant First Class (Ret.) Samuel Bobe-Gonzalez have a combined total of 33 years at Franklin High School in this program, the purpose of which is to motivate Young People to be Better Citizens. What these leaders have done in practice is so much more. "We create leaders," says Maj. Vazquez who founded the program at FHS 20 years ago. "JROTC has helped students gain character attributes, leadership, and life skills they can apply in their education, career, and life. We provide students with the strength, inspiration, and guidance to succeed in accomplishing their goals in life." Beyond guidance, there is another level of support to the program, Sgt. Bobe elaborates, "The FHS JROTC Warrior Battalion is a family-oriented class in which cadets feel a sense of belonging. Where they learn skills for life, where they enjoy, laugh, cry, and learn to resolve, in a passive way, their personal and social problems." This feeling of family can also be seen when alumni of the program, who are now parents, encourage their own children to join JROTC. What makes these leaders proud? Maj. Vazquez shares that in addition to the various awards the Drill, Raider, Color Guard, Academic, and Leadership Teams have won at JROTC annual competitions, the FHS JROTC Program was awarded the "Honor Unit with Distinction" during its first JROTC Program for Accreditation (JPA) inspection in 2007. This recognition is the highest award a program can earn in JROTC. She is also very proud that the Program has maintained its Honor Unit with Distinction status in subsequent reviews. What are their plans for the future? Among other things, Major "Abuelita" plans to step in when duty to her grandchildren calls and Sgt. Bobe plans to continue his worldwide travel with his family and looking for other ways to serve humanity.



Julie Ochoa, retiring Supervisor of English as a Second Language (ESL) and Bilingual Programs, grew up in a bilingual household, where being bilingual, biliterate and well-educated was highly valued. She says those values, along with her need to feel useful, drew her to a career in education. Ms. Ochoa has been with the district for twenty years and has served the students of FTPS as a bilingual teacher, instructional coach and then as the Supervisor of ESL and Bilingual Programs since 2009. Serving and advocating for her students has truly been her mindset. "I have always said that although I am employed by Franklin Township Public Schools, I work for our children and their families," she explained. Her advocacy and dedication have led to the NJ Department of Education granting Model Program status to the FTPS elementary bilingual and several ESL programs in the past. FTPS was also the first in the State to provide ESL services through Science and Social Studies at the elementary level, a practice many other districts have followed. "In order for any student to succeed in school, they have to have a sense of belonging and simple compliance [with the law] doesn't foster belonging; it takes embracing our students, their backgrounds and their needs with commitment," says Ms. Ochoa. She says it brings her joy when she sees other staff members embracing that commitment, with something as simple as suggesting a flyer be translated into another language. She has worked toward providing a feeling of belonging for her students by focusing on program cohesion and expanding supports to the students who are newest to learning English. This may take the form of providing opportunities for collaboration through co-taught classes at the secondary level or using the Sheltered Instruction model, which focuses on not only increasing English fluency but on higher academic content. After retirement, Ms. Ochoa plans on continuing to work in the area of Sheltered Instruction, providing support for other educators. Traveling with her family is also on her future agenda with upcoming stops in Guadalajara, Mexico; New England and Norway to see the northern lights.



Michael Pinnix, filmmaker and veteran Television Production teacher at Franklin High School will be retiring at the end of the 23/24 school year. Mr. P, as he is sometimes known to his students, has built a legacy at FHS. Through teaching and mentoring his own students to facilitating the production of a weekly video news spot (WANT TV); an annual gala award show (the AVA's) and the district's Focus on Franklin video news magazines, his dedication and creativity have truly made a difference to the Franklin community. He came to the district with a background in broadcasting to help develop and write a curriculum for what is now the Aspects of Video Program. The Aspects Program, Mr. Pinnix says, "started as an after-school program by retired math teacher and track coach Mr. Terrell, who had a love for videography." The Program, which introduces students to all aspects of the television and digital media industry, has grown to include a Career Technical Education (CTE) component with a sequence of courses and an opportunity to pursue college credit, participate in work-based learning opportunities (internships) and receive Adobe Certification in editing by senior year. Technology

has changed over the last twenty years, so has the focus of the classroom, from a more technical approach of camera angles to learning how, "to create content instead of just viewing content." As for the evolution of Franklin High School's annual video award show, Mr. Pinnix credits his Emmy nomination for Best Videography and his attendance at the Mid Atlantic Emmy Award ceremony in Philadelphia as inspiration for the AVA's. "I knew I wanted to plan an annual event that would highlight my students' hard work in developing films during the school year," he says. The traditional award shows in the early 2000's were popular but the birth of MTV, BET, and Hip-Hop award shows also provided a new light on how we celebrate the arts community with a new generation of youth," explains Mr. Pinnix. "I wanted to duplicate that look but also that feeling of excitement and the feeling of being special for that one night." The show has grown to include live entertainment from current FHS Warriors and recognition of Aspects alumni who have returned to be honored at the show. Many Aspects alumni who Mr. P has mentored have kept in touch with him over the years and some have returned to share their knowledge and experience with his current students. Mr. Pinnix hopes that the alumni network will continue to flourish after he leaves FHS. As for his personal plans...Mr. Pinnix plans on continuing as a freelance producer/director/videographer and editor and to work on some other projects. But spending time with his wife, children and grandchildren will come first.



A final word about another dedicated district employee who retired earlier this school year. A fond farewell to Ms. Jackie Schneider, a true Franklin Warrior who graduated from FHS and whose three children also graduated from Franklin schools. Ms. Schneider served the faculty and staff of FTPS district for more than 15 years in various leadership positions in the Human Resources Department. Ms. Schneider has recruited, supported, celebrated, consoled and guided countless staff members from onboarding forms through retirement filings. She has left the district to spend more time with her own family but she will always be a part of the FTPS family.
