Has it been awhile since you reviewed New Jersey's Driver Manual. The Police Department offers the following reminders for safe travel.

When do I have to stop for pedestrians crossing the street? At all crosswalks or only where there are posted signs to stop for pedestrians in the crosswalk?

Every intersection of the roadway is designated a crosswalk, whether marked or not. NJSA 39:4-36 states, "The driver of a vehicle shall yield the right of way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, except at crosswalks when the movement of traffic is being regulated by police officer or traffic control signal."

When are the car's bright lights suppose to be turned off in traffic?

When approaching a vehicle in either direction.

On a street like Easton Avenue with a cement divider between lanes, do cars going in the opposite direction have to stop for a stopped school bus?

No, however, NJSA 39:4-128.1 states, "on highways having dual or multiple roadways separated by a safety island or physical traffic separation installations,...the driver of a vehicle on another roadway approaching a school bus which has stopped...shall reduce the speed of his vehicle to not more than 10 miles per hour and shall not resume normal speed until the vehicle has passed the bus and has passed any children who have alighted there from."

Do passengers in the back seat have to wear a seatbelt?

The laws governing seatbelt usage can be found under NJSA 39:3-76.2f. Basically, anyone in the front seats of a vehicle must wear a seatbelt. Additionally, anyone under the age of 18 in the rear of a vehicle must wear a seatbelt.

Can animals be in the car with their head hanging out the window?

Currently there are no laws against this. Before you allow your pet to stick their head out of the window consider that they could be injured if they are struck by debris from the roadway.

Do I have to pull over for cars with blue lights (example: rescue squad cars) the same as I do for an ambulance?

Blue lights used by volunteers are courtesy lights. If you see someone coming up behind you with a flashing blue light you should pull to the side, if safe to do so, and allow them to pass. They are on their way to the first-aid building or fire house to handle a call.

For narrow, two-lane roads like South Middlebush Road, is it legal to pass on the right if there is room when a car is turning left?

No. It is improper to pass a vehicle on the right hand side

Are dark-tinted windows legal?

"Tint" is not permitted on the front driver's or passenger's side windows.

Can I get a ticket if my headlight is out?

Yes. NJSA 39:3-49 mandates that, "all motor vehicles other than a motorcycle shall be equipped with at least 2 approved headlamps mounted at the same level with an equal number on each side of the front of the vehicle."

Can someone get a ticket for driving too slow?

Yes - NJSA 39:4-56 states, "No person shall drive...as to be likely to cause delay in traffic or accident to man, beast or property."


I've seen the "X" on dead deer along the road. Who is responsible for removing smaller animals who have been killed and are in the middle of the road?

The (Department of Public Works) Township and County have contracts with companies that will remove deer that have been struck, while NJDOT handles state highways. Animal Control removes smaller animals from the roadway.

If I'm turning left onto a four-lane road, do I turn into the lane nearest the left lane (nearest to the center line) or the right lane?

This is dictated by the intersection. NJSA 39:4-123 indicates that right hand turns shall be made as close as practicable to the right hand curb and left hand turns shall be made as close as practicable to the left hand curb. NJSA 39:4-14 indicates that the State Highway Commissioner and local authorities may modify NJSA 39:4-123 by clearly indicating by buttons, markers, or other direction signs, within an intersection the course to be followed.

Do I have to stop for ice cream trucks stopped in the road serving or waiting for customers?



Is there a law against driving with your car's interior lights turned on?

There is no law prohibiting this; however, it is not recommended because it could make viewing the road more difficult.

Can someone get a ticket for throwing garbage out a car window?

Yes. NJSA 39:4-64 states, "No person shall throw or drop any bundle, object, article or debris of any nature from a vehicle whether in motion or not..."

While it is obvious that combing your hair or reading creates an unsafe driving situation, is it illegal if no accident occurs? Would a police officer pull over someone combing their hair, and could that person get a ticket?

Yes. NJSA 39:4-97 states, "A person who drives a vehicle carelessly, or without due caution and circumspection, in a manner so as to endanger, or be likely to endanger, a person or property shall be guilty of careless driving." When you are operating a vehicle, you must focus on that.

How close is too close when driving behind another vehicle?

NJSA 39:3-89 states, "The driver of a vehicle shall not follow another vehicle more closely than is reasonable and prudent, having due regard for speed of the preceding vehicle and the traffic upon, and condition of, the highway."

Do all accidents have to be reported?

NJSA 39:4-130 states, "The driver of a vehicle or street car involved in an accident resulting in injury to or death of any person, or damage to property of any person in excess of \$500.00 shall by the quickest means of communication give notice of such accident to the local police..." With that being said, if there is no damage and no injuries, it doesn't have to be reported.

Is it legal to wear earphones when driving?

There are currently no laws prohibiting the use of earphones while driving. However, if you are using them to listen to music, it could cause you to not hear the sirens of an approaching emergency vehicle.

Is there some law against drivers blaring their radios?

Currently, there are no state laws governing this. Most municipalities have an ordinance that will address this type of behavior. Franklin Township T.O. 167-8 states, "Personal or commercial vehicular music amplification or reproduction equipment shall not be operated in such a manner that is plainly audible at a residential property line between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. Personal vehicular music amplification equipment shall not be operated in such a manner as to be plainly audible at a distance of 50 feet in any direction from the operator between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m."

Is it legal for motorcycles to drive between the lanes of traffic?

No – Motorcycles must be driven in the travel portion of the roadway and obey all traffic laws and lane markings that denote right of way.

"Keep to the right" --Is that only for highways or all 4-lane roads like Easton Avenue and Amwell Road?

Yes, it applies to ALL multi-lane roadways. NJSA 39:4-88a states, "A vehicle shall normally be driven in the lane nearest the right-hand edge or curb of the roadway when that lane is available for travel, except when overtaking another vehicle or in preparation for a left turn."

Do you have to pull to the right and stop for ambulances that have their lights on but are not using a siren? Is this the same for 2- and 4-lane roads?

Yes – anytime an emergency vehicle has its warning lights illuminated, both directions of travel are required to pull to the right hand side and stop until the vehicle passes.

Frequently Asked Questions?

There is a street light out in front of my house. Who do I contact to get it fixed?

Each street light pole has a number on the metal tag on the pole. Call PSE&G at 1-800-436-7734 with the pole number, street name, nearest cross street and the address location of the pole.

I am not receiving my copy of the Franklin Times. How do I get my name on the distribution list?

We don't use addresses for the newsletter. They go out via bulk mail. The Post office is suppose to deliver to every mail box, every post office box, and every business. The company who prints the newsletter has the responsibility to make sure the almost 29,000 copies of the newsletter are prepared for the post office to make this type of bulk delivery. We hear some carriers are not following the rules, leaving 5 at one business, leaving a stack on the post office lobby shelves, etc. If a resident does not receive a copy of the newsletter and thinks they have been missed, they can call 732-873-2500, ext. 6239, and a copy will be mailed.

Smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. What's the minimum needed and where should they be located?

Smoke alarms--At least one smoke detector shall be installed on each level of the dwelling. If there are separate sleeping areas on any level, additional detectors are required in the immediate vicinity of each separate sleeping area.

Carbon monoxide alarms--Detectors must be installed outside of the bedroom or sleeping area, within 10' of bedroom doors.

EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION AVAILABLE Sign Up or Re-Enroll

Residents and businesses are encouraged to enroll in the Township's new Citizen Notification System. Residents can now specify how they are notified (text, email, or phone) and in what order they want to receive the notifications.

Residents are also encouraged to sign up for our new optional alert categories as well. They include tax bill reminders, general Township events and more! Residents who previously enrolled in our old system WILL have to enroll again in the new system to ensure they receive the proper alerts. Franklin Improves Its FEMA Flood Rating

Franklin Township joined FEMA's CRS (Community Rating System) program in May, 2009 with a Class 7 rating. This meant immediate relief to residents living in a SFHA (Special Flood Hazard Area, more commonly known as a 100-year flood zone) by way of 15% discounts on their Flood Insurance policies. Residents outside of the SFHA received 5% discounts on their policies.

One requisite of the program is a revaluation visit every five years. Due to the efforts of Franklin Township officials and employees in working to minimize flooding risks and improving emergency preparedness, FEMA has awarded the Township with an upgrade to a Class 6 CRS rating. This now means 20% discounts on SFHA flood insurance policies and 10% discounts on non-SFHA policies. The discounts will become effective on May 1, 2015.

Less than 5% of New Jersey communities have attained a CRS rating of 6 or better, with the majority of those being vulnerable shore communities. Franklin Township is proud of its continued commitment to informational outreach to residents, emergency preparedness planning, and hazard mitigation efforts in order to be as ready as possible for the next big storm.

Ebola: What Franklin Township Needs to Know

We hear your concern

There has been a lot of news coverage in recent days about the Ebola virus, and some members of the community are asking questions and expressing unease. Seeing headlines about a disease outbreak can be worrisome, and you may be thinking about the safety of yourself, your family and your community. Somerset County Department of Health is concerned about protecting you as well, and is working towards ensuring prompt and effective response should a case of Ebola occur in our area.

We want you to know about the disease.

Ebola is a rare and deadly disease caused by infection with one of the Ebola viruses. Some people who become sick with Ebola are able to recover, while others do not. The reasons behind this are not fully understood. Recovery from Ebola largely depends on a patient's development of antibodies to fight the disease. Evidence shows that people who recover from Ebola infection develop antibodies that last for at least ten years, possibly longer. The current Ebola outbreak is most widespread and intense in some countries in West Africa, although travel and healthcare related cases have appeared in other countries. It does not naturally exist in the U.S. As of November 10, 2014 when the *Franklin Times* was sent to the printer, there are no people in New Jersey with Ebola and the risk to residents becoming infected with Ebola is currently very low.

Ebola isn't easy to catch. Unlike the flu and measles, Ebola is NOT spread through the air. You can only get Ebola from touching body fluids of someone who is currently sick with (has symptoms), or has died from, Ebola. Early Ebola symptoms include fever, headache, body aches, cough, stomach pain, vomiting, and diarrhea, while internal and external bleeding is common as the disease progresses. The time it takes from exposure to Ebola to actually getting sick is anywhere from 2 to 21 days. The only treatment doctors can provide is supportive care – they give the patient fluids and oxygen, and keep their blood pressure steady. However, early detection and treatment increases the odds of recovery.

We want you to know what we are doing.

The U.S. and world Ebola situation is regularly changing, but Somerset County Department of Health and our Public Health Partners are working to keep up with the changes and we are focused on being prepared to rapidly and appropriately respond as necessary to protect our communities.

Somerset County and the New Jersey Department of Health have a long-standing and well-established disease monitoring and tracking system in place that looks for many diseases, including Ebola. This system is a collaborative effort among state public health, federal health authorities including the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and its office of Global Migration and Quarantine, local public health, and the health care community. This is a strong, effective team process that works.

Our County Health Officer, along with other county, state and federal Health partners have reached out to medical professionals and hospital administrators with reminders of the need to look for symptoms that could indicate Ebola virus disease, and then to ask about travel to affected countries or potential exposure. If there is a suspected Ebola case in our area, we have public health staff trained and ready to identify contacts of patients.

We are communicating with hospitals and emergency departments, emergency medical services and responders, health care providers and other partners so that everyone will respond appropriately in the unlikely event Ebola comes here. We are keeping up with the latest federal guidance and widely sharing that information. We are learning from the experience of other states that have received patients, and adjusting and strengthening our protocols based on what we are learning. We have reviewed our quarantine and isolation protocols to assure that the public is protected and affected individuals are afforded the most appropriate care, guidance and medical assistance.

We want you to have access to accurate, updated information.

The people in our communities need the most up-to-date, accurate and reliable information. We have updated our website to include fact sheets, links and resources most relevant to our residents, and have provided this information to our municipalities, schools, faith based communities and others to post on their websites and share widely, too. Books and Your Kids

Did you know that you hold a secret treasure to share with your children? It is the books that *you* read as a child, including the books that were read to you. Introduce your children to some of these books and share why you liked them. You will probably find them at the library. If you can't remember the title, the children's librarians are very good at finding them for you.

Here are some more ways that you can encourage a love of reading in your children:

Let them see you reading. Talk about what you read and encourage discussion.

Read to your child. When you read to your child, you are doing more than building a reader. You are building a lifetime of wonderful memories and developing a relationship that will last beyond the parenting years. In the end, that's the most important thing of all.

Explore different kinds of books together: picture books, nonfiction, chapter books, folktales and fairy tales. No matter what type of book, there are pictures and topics to discuss. Ask your child questions about something that you read together. Have a discussion about what your child is reading at home and in school. Having a conversation about what you read together helps children learn how to talk to people, how to listen, how to articulate their thoughts, and how to imagine.

Here are some suggestions: Ask questions like, "What would you do if you found Winn-Dixie?" (Because of Winn-Dixie by Kate DiCamillo) or "Do you think the farmer knew that Charlotte was in his barn?" (Charlotte's Web by E.B. White). Marvel at the pictures in any book that won the Caldecott Medal for excellence in illustration, like David Wiesner's The Three Pigs. Share the adventures of the Pye family when their beloved dog, Ginger, is kidnapped in Ginger Pye by Eleanor Estes. Watch the film The Wizard of Oz and then read the original book by L. Frank Baum (which was the "Harry Potter" of its time over 100 years ago) and see how the book and the movie are different.

Local Plastic Bag Recycling Trial Ends

The popular plastic bag recycling program, which was available solely through containers located in Municipal Buildings and the Library, ended October 1.

Residents may be able to continue recycling clean and dry plastics at major grocery stores or large box stores. The recyclable plastics include grocery bags, dry cleaning bags, overwrap from toilet paper, napkins and paper towels, shrink wrap from cases of water and soda, and bubble wrap.

The company providing the free service to Franklin and other communities and organizations downsized and was overwhelmed by the short-lived but very successful program. In six months, the Township collected over 991 pounds of plastics, or an equivalent of 74,918 plastic grocery bags. In addition, the company paid the Township \$277.48.

Another problem was that some people were using the collection containers, designed for only clean and dry plastics, for disposal of other items. This led to the expensive, time-consuming sifting through of all contents.

This program was independent of the recycling program provided by Somerset County. Residents should continue to put their plastic bottles at curbside along with glass bottles and cans.
